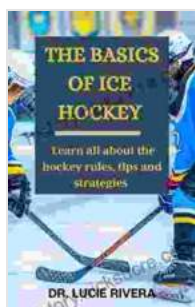


The Basics of Ice Hockey: A Comprehensive Guide for Beginners

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The Basics

The puck is a small, black disc that is about 3 inches in diameter. It is made of vulcanized rubber and weighs about 6 ounces.

The players use sticks to shoot, pass, and control the puck. Sticks are made of wood or composite materials and are about 60 inches long.

The Rules

The Game

The Stanley Cup is the championship trophy of the NHL. It is awarded to the team that wins the Stanley Cup Finals.

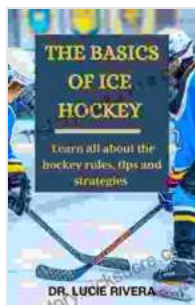

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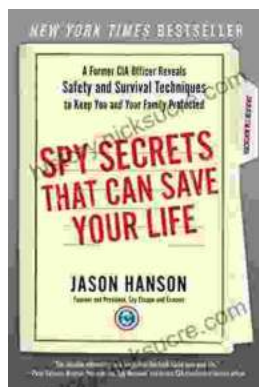
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
